### **LODGE RECORDS**

For many years, Immokalee Lodge kept records of its members on the official membership cards issued by the national office. From what appears to be approximately 1968 to about 1987, these cards were maintained. Cards of active members were kept in a membership book. At some point, a very nice box was built for the purpose of storing the cards of the active members. Each card has a place for a member number and over half of the cards have numbers. Most numbers are ascending by Ordeal date. However, about 45% of the cards do not have a number and there seems to be no pattern to the failure to assign numbers as those without numbers are from all years.

The Lodge does not have any original records of members previous to the 1968 cards. There are cards whose Ordeal per-dates 1968. These members were probably still active in 1968 or re-joined later. At some point, someone compiled a list of members from Ordeals prior to 1968 into a typed book. However, except for the information on the cards, there is no record of Brotherhood membership prior to 1994.

It is interesting to note that member #2, inducted in June, 1952 was Dr. Carl Hancock, current Council President.

The lodge continues to add pages to the book, but has not numbered new members since 1987. The last number in the book is 1315, assigned to Mike Wohrley, Jr who completed his ordeal in August, 1986. Since 1994, our Lodge has maintained a list of new members at each Ordeal and of those members who became Brotherhood members.

A computer database has been compiled and contains the information from the typed book and the cards and from other sources. A limited amount of information for each member is shown on the web site.

# **2005 DUES**

#### 2004 HIGH ADVENTURE TRIP

In July of this year, two crews of scouts from our council made an 18 day trip to one of BSA's high adventure bases, the canoe base at Atikokan, Ontario, Canada. The group was composed of 15 youth and 6 adults and most of these were members of Immokalee Lodge. One crew was all Troop 21 from Americus. The other was Troop 3 from Albany, with a couple of invaluable guys from Rebecca, Georgia.

On the trip we had the luxury of traveling in Troop 21's bus. It was complete with nice, comfortable seats, curtains, a restroom and a great entertainment system. It was safely chauffeured by Tommy McCurley, Scoutmaster of Troop 21, with some assistance from John Carroll, Assistant SM.

On the trip up we stopped at the Corvette Museum in Kentucky, spent a couple of days sight seeing in Chicago and spent a wet and cold 4<sup>th</sup> of July in Duluth, Minnesota. When we arrived in Canada, it didn't seem much different from South Georgia, except that it was largely wilderness and the Canadians spoke a different brand of English.

The first day at the canoe base we had our shake down and met our "interpreters", both of whom were young ladies from Canada. Each crew plotted its own itinerary. On July 6 we all set out for nine days on the water. It was nine days of paddling through beautiful wilderness, each night camping on a small island or sometimes wooded mainland. We fished, swam, carried out canoes and packs around rapids and from one lake to another (it's called portaging), fought mosquitoes and saw some wildlife (moose, beavers, ducks and eagles). It was hard work, but it was fun. By the time we got back to base camp, everyone was tired and ready to get back to civilization.

On the way back we stopped at Ft. Knox, Kentucky (couldn't get anywhere near the gold!) And

spent an evening in Nashville, Tennessee. When we got back to South Georgia, everyone had the feeling that we would miss the good time we had and would remember it for a long time.
